Province of New-Hampshire.

**W**HEREAS a LIGHT-HOUSE  
has been lately erected at the Ex-  
pence of the said Province, on  
Fort-Point, at the Entrance of the Harbour  
of Piscataqua, for the greater Safety of all  
Ships and Vessels trading thereto; — In  
order to render the same of more general  
Benefit and Utility to the Public, the fol-  
lowing Directions are published from a  
Survey made by Pilots experienced in Na-  
vigation into the said Harbour.

"As the Light-House is erected on  
"Fort-Point, we find it necessary that all  
"Ships or Vessels coming from the East-  
"ward should keep in twelve Fathom of  
"Water until the Light bears North,  
"North one half West, and North one  
"half East, Distance about three Miles,  
"and then bear away for the Light-House,  
"keeping the Western Shore on board,  
"and coming no nearer that Shore than  
"nine Fathom of Water, giving the Light  
"a proper Birth, and also stand over to  
"the North Shore, and anchor in nine  
"Fathom of Water, abreast of Sparhawk's  
"Point, so called; — And all Ships or  
"Vessels coming from the Southward,  
"are to observe the same Directions re-  
"specting the Light as above, and keep  
"in nine Fathom of Water, on the West-  
"ern Shore."

CHARLESTOWN, (S. Carolina) Dec. 10.  
Dec. 24. Capt. Obear, of the Brig Pitt  
Packet on his Passage from Eustatia, eighty  
leagues east of Charlestown Bar, met with a  
schooner belonging to Mr. Withers of San-  
tee, in great distress, having her main boom  
and mainsail over-board, three of the boat  
negroes frost-bitten, and without water: —  
Capt. Obear gave them all the assistance  
in his power, and took out of the schooner  
two white women with each a child, and  
two Negroes.

The Rev. Dr. Smith of Philadelphia who  
is now here, this day published a very ele-  
gant and affecting representation, addressed

Dec. 31. We hear from New-York, that  
the Royal American Regiment now in Can-  
ada, is to be stationed in the West-India

will be removed to Florida & Nova-Scotia.
