

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

The two Light Houses lately built on Cape Elizabeth, on the coast of Maine, will be lit up on the night of the 20th October inst. They stand 300 yards distant from each other and about the same distance from the sea shore; the Lanterns are 140 feet above the level of the sea at high water; the northeasterly light will be a fixed light, and the southwesterly a revolving, showing a brilliant light, and appearing dark, alternately, every minute and a half. The two lights bear from each other S.W. 1-2 W. and N.E. 1-2 E.

The following are the bearings and distances from the northeasterly light, of the shoals and reefs, and of other Light Houses in sight of and near the Cape, viz:
