

BAY. COAST OF MAINE—Notice is hereby given that, on and after Oct 15, 1875, a light will be shown from the lighthouse recently erected at the southerly end of Avery's Rock. The light will be fixed red. The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric, of the 5th order, lighting 360 degrees of the horizon. The focal plane is 36 feet above the ground and 68 feet above mean low water. The light should be seen in clear weather, from the deck of a vessel 15 feet above the sea, 14 nautical miles. The structure is a square brick tower rising from the centre of a one-story square brick building. The color of the exterior of the tower and building is white. The approximate position of the lighthouse, as taken from the Coast Survey Charts, is as follows: Lat 41 89 N, lon 67 21 W. Magnetic bearings and distances of prominent objects are as follows: Libby Island lighthouse, SW by S, $5\frac{1}{4}$ nautical miles; round island, N by E, $\frac{3}{4}$ nautical mile. Notice is also given that there will be sounded, through thick and foggy weather, a fog-bell, struck by machinery, giving two blows in quick succession, alternately with a single blow, at intervals of 30 seconds.
